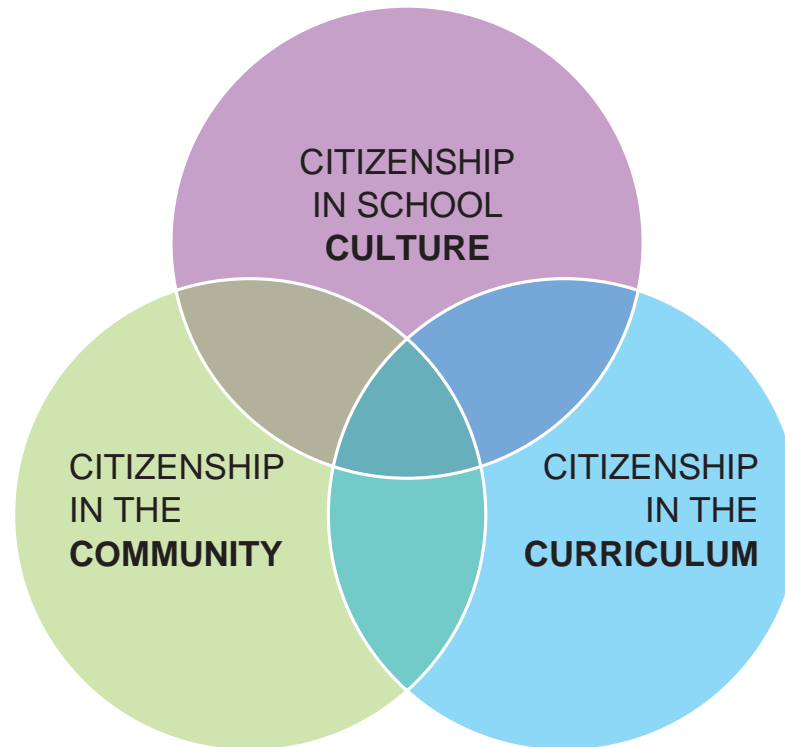


What Might You See In A Citizenship-Rich School?
