Citizenship pervades the culture of the school through formal and informal opportunities

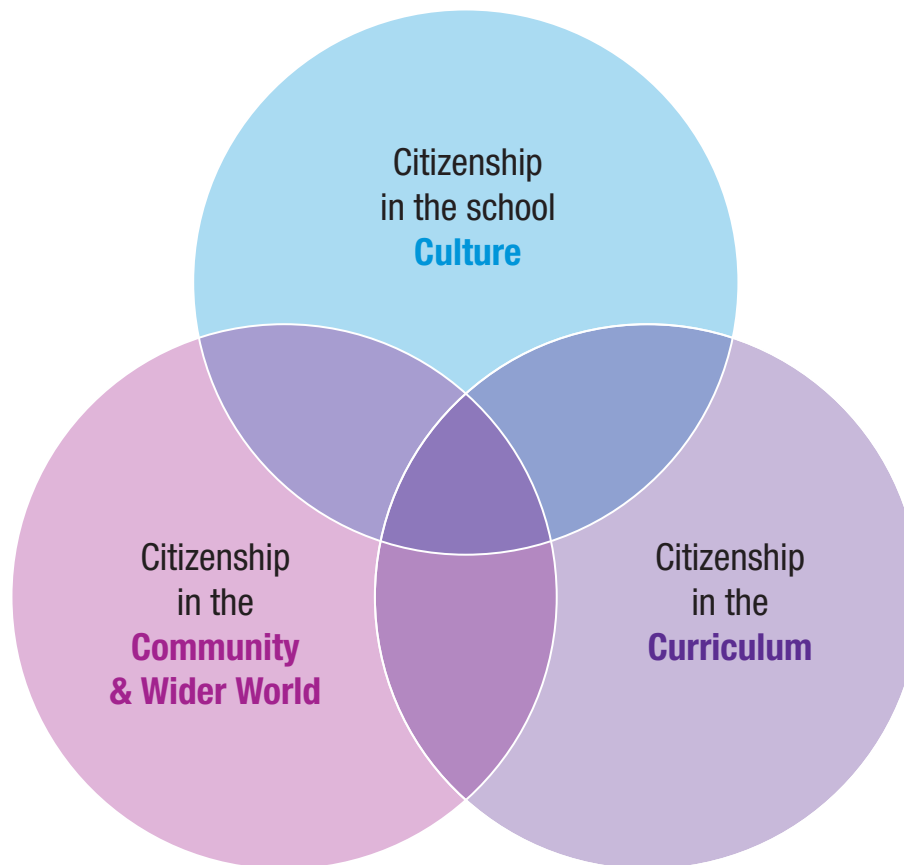
For example, an effective school council, SMSC, active citizenship and volunteering, engaged citizens and cohesive communities.

Citizenship enhances learning in other subjects and through the whole school dimensions in a very focused way

For example, for example Global Learning and sustainable living linking Citizenship to Geography, Science and English.

Numerous high quality learning experiences, with pupil voice and action

For example, pupils investigate community safety plans with local council and present findings to community agencies and services including the Police.



Citizenship is understood and valued by all

Staff, pupils and parents comprehend what the subject of Citizenship is – and recognise it's educational worth as part of the curriculum.

Discrete curriculum time and specialist teacher(s) for Citizenship

Citizenship is not sidelined, but has dedicated staff who are passionate about their subject – and discrete Citizenship lessons are timetabled.

For example, all pupils do Citizenship GCSE; pupils run the school recycling scheme.
