Lord Blunkett Outstanding Contribution to Citizenship Education



David Kerr

David Kerr has a long history of involvement in the development of Citizenship. In 1998 as Professional Officer to the Crick Group and then as an adviser to the DfE, QCA and the Council of Europe. For 10 years he led ground-breaking Citizenship research at national and international levels, including the Citizenship Education Longitudinal Study (CELS) and CIVED and ICCS10 studies.

David goes above and beyond to keep Citizenship education on the agenda, working in a voluntary capacity with so many organisations, he does so in a very humble and approachable way... He is someone that influenced my thinking around Citizenship education whilst training... Many students have learned from his nononsense style which is informative but yet also challenges thinking around deep conceptual ideas found within our subject.

Helen Blachford

Helen trained in business education but has been teaching Citizenship for over 20 years. She is a committed member of ACT Council and has helped to plan national conferences, written articles for the journal, and worked on curriculum briefings, lessons and resources to support other teachers with the National Curriculum. Helen became Chair of ACT Council in 2015 and joined the ACT Board of Trustees in June 2020. As an ACT Teaching Ambassador, Helen shares her expertise with the Citizenship community through delivering training, meetings and advice. She is one of the leading experts in Media Literacy for Citizenship and co-developed an innovative CPD course for other teachers.

She is committed to informing, educating and inspiring future game changers in education. The Politics Project

The Politics Project has supported powerful conversations about political issues using technology since 2015. This year they worked with over 200 teachers and 2500 students, through the Digital Surgeries programme to connect young people and politicians in England and Wales. They provide resources to support teaching about the democratic system in the UK and coordinate 'Democracy Classroom', a partnership of over 45 non-partisan organisations to support pupils' engagement in elections.

The Politics Project has been such an amazing tool in connecting my pupils to elected leaders around the country...I always enjoy our sessions, particularly when my pupils ask questions which are more insightful and hard-hitting than journalists!



The UK Education and Engagement Team

The UK Education and Engagement Team works to educate young people about Citizenship, government and politics. The team enables students to access politics in the UK in innovative ways and provides outstanding opportunities for teacher development through the prestigious Summer Institute, the Teachers Network and teaching awards programme. Throughout the pandemic, they were quick to provide alternative provision for teachers and students when faceto-face was not an option. The historic halls of parliament become a place of excitement and inspiration for students on tour, both in-person and virtually.

Having visited parliament and met MPs and Lords, many of my graduated students are now taking politics and law at university. It is incredible organisations like the Parliament Education Centre that have brought politics to life for students. The whole team deserves recognition for the work they do.



Trainee Teacher of the Year



Ellen Hall

Ellen has taught Politics, History, Citizenship and P.E. during her PGCE year and enjoyed leading and coaching different extracurricular activities, such as hockey, netball, debating, podcasting and a girl's football club. Ellen has described her experience as a trainee teacher as intense at times, but overwhelmingly rewarding.

As a trainee teacher it can be challenging to feel you have made an impact during your limited time in a placement school but it is clear to see that through an innovative pedagogical approach, Ellen has done just this. She has used podcasts to engage young people on a variety of topical issues...These podcasts have then been shared across schools in Northern Ireland allowing others to learn from Ellen's work and hear the views of her pupils.



Ella Rattan

Ella graduated from the University of Manchester in Politics, Philosophy and Economics and decided to follow a family tradition in teaching and education. She completed her PGCE in Citizenship at the IOE in the summer of 2022 and recently joined the ACT Council as the Early Career representative.

Ella [is] always thinking about how to make Citizenship learning engaging for young people...and was keen to get more involved in ACT. She put herself forward for the council position and has subsequently written a piece with her fellow ACT student rep for the next edition of Teaching Citizenship.



Fiona Shelton

Fiona was born and raised in Sheffield but spent 20 years living in London and the South East. Mum of three, Fiona's return home to the Derbyshire's High Peak, started a chain of events which led to her to train as a Citizenship teacher. In her spare time Fiona enjoys musical theatre, working with stained glass and following Sheffield Wednesday Football Club.

Elected as ACT PGCE Student Rep for this year, she offers all PGCE Citizenship students strong and effective representation...Her collaboration and negotiation skills mean that getting PGCE Student voice heard is not a problem for her.

For 14 years Bryden has inspired pupils with his innovative teaching approaches. Since 2017 he has taught GCSE Citizenship Studies to pupils at Perrins School, where he ensures they have the knowledge and skills they need to become informed and active citizens and see the value of Citizenship in their daily lives and decisions. In 2019, he used his enthusiasm and subject expertise in media literacy to co-develop a ground-breaking CPD course and regularly shares his expertise and GCSE classroom practice with others as an ACT Ambassador Teacher.

Mr Joy is a diligent, inspiring and committed teacher, who goes out of his way to support his students, not only in helping them in exam technique and marking practise questions, but also in a pastoral manner, as he supports students to get involved and engaged, bringing a genuine positivity to the classroom.



Active Citizenship School of the Year

The Hampton School

The @genocide8020 student group led by Andy Lawrence at Hampton School uses the principles of Active Citizenship. When training teachers and student teachers about Active Citizenship, emphasis is given to the importance of the role of students themselves in leading the actions being planned and the role of the teacher working in partnership with them to facilitate the pupils' ideas. The work and the ethos of Hampton School has allowed this to develop and the excellent work of the @genocide8020 project is testament to this.





Leeds City Academy

Active Citizenship is at the core of Leeds City Academy. From the Principal actively engaging with students and listening to their ideas for improving the academy, to the entitlement for all students to participate in Citizenship lessons, the concept of Active Citizenship is in the curriculum and the ethos of the school. The newly reorganised school parliament allows students to work within different departments to create

real change, from democratically chosen charities to the environment group work on school policies.
Students as Community Impact
Leaders work with local decision makers and neighbourhood groups on tree planting, graffiti cleaning and creating an eco-garden.
Students engage with a vast range of opportunities and become empowered to create meaningful change in a way that is important to them.



Royal Wooton Bassett Academy

Royal Wootton Bassett students and staff exemplify the principles of Active Citizenship. Staff support, inform and empower students through work on Holocaust, genocide and human rights, as volunteers during lockdowns helping their neighbours, welcoming refugees into the school or numerous opportunities for student leadership. The school is celebrated for work around the Holocaust led by Nic Wetherall and her team and 'The Holocaust, Their Family, Me and



Us' project. The annual 'Empowering Young People To Change The World Conference' enables teachers across the country to engage with powerful guest speakers and facilitate the development of empowered young leaders in their own schools.

John McCloskey


John is Head of Integrated and **Religious Studies and Learning** for Life and Work Coordinator at Shimna Integrated College in County Down. His work focuses on teaching Citizenship in post-conflict Northern Ireland in a school which deliberately coeducates across traditional religious and political divides. Outside of the curriculum, John coordinates projects where students create and distribute documentary teaching resources giving voice to minority groups in Northern Ireland such as refugees and religious minorities. John is currently advising a Stormont panel on best practice in SRE and is co-lead of Shimna's Amnesty International Group, the largest youth rights advocacy group in Northern Ireland.

Samantha Hunt

Sam is an experienced deputy headteacher with a passion for the principles of Citizenship Education. As an RE teacher she became expert in Holocaust studies and human rights, and is dedicated to teaching students about the dangers of intolerance. Sam's commitment goes beyond the classroom as she organises volunteering opportunities for students with the local homeless and refugees in Calais. Sam's aim is to inspire students to "be the change" something she lives up to herself. She has recently opened a school in Rwanda to provide free education to homeless orphans, is an academic advisor to the charity Remembering Srebrenica, a volunteer for the Holocaust Educational Trust and Chair of Survivors Fund, a charity which works to rebuild the lives of survivors of the genocide against the



Tutsi in Rwanda. In her own time she trains other teachers and believes that providing students with active Citizenship goes hand in hand with learning about Citizenship.



Secondary School Teacher of the Year

Sera Shortland

Sera is Head of Citizenship at New College Leicester, runs a Leicester 'political speaking' competition and is passionate about social justice issues. Sera enjoys teaching GCSE Citizenship Studies, especially the law. In 2018 Sera became a member of ACT Council and an ACT **Teaching Ambassador** supporting teachers locally and nationally with GCSE Citizenship Studies and teaching Citizenship. Sera's passion is to encourage student voice and many of her students have been elected to the local youth council and she recently established a successful student parliament to lead improvements and decision making in her school.





Zoe is subject leader of Citizenship at Our Lady Queen of Peace Catholic Engineering College in Skelmersdale, Lancashire where she qualified as an RE teacher. At Our Lady's, Zoe has nurtured her passion for Citizenship and developed the Citizenship GCSE offer and the Curriculum for Life school- wide programme.



School of the Year

Addey and Stanhope

Jan Shaprio, Headteacher, and the team at Addey and Stanhope demonstrate the principles of Citizenship at every level of school life. Citizenship is high profile and deeply embedded with a rigorous, well planned curriculum which is taught with enthusiasm at key stage 3 and 4. Ryan Mason has led Citizenship in the school for over 10 years and



consistently motivates pupils to continue to study the subject to GCSE where the subject is regularly oversubscribed. Ryan designs opportunities for students to organise conferences, engage with local politicians and join active Citizenship projects. Both Jan and Ryan speak passionately about the importance of the subject to their students and the communities they serve. Visitors to the school, be they Ofsted inspectors, international visitors or the local MP see the impact of the subject and the value students place on it. The Addey and Stanhope approach to Citizenship is visionary and exemplifies what is possible in the curriculum and the ethos of every school for every pupil across the country.

Brockhill Performing Arts College

Brockhill Park Performing Arts College in the rural and coastal part of Kent has had an ethos grounded in the principles of Citizenship since 2000, when two teachers began training for the then new subject. Commitment to the subject has continued ever since, with all students benefiting from a planned curriculum of Citizenship lessons at key stage 3 and 4 and studying for GCSE Citizenship Studies. In addition, pupils can choose from a rich offer to get involved in Citizenship

actively either as elected members of school council or during school-wide elections and hustings events. The school is committed to teacher training and works with a local provider and has offered placements to over 100 trainee Citizenship teachers over the past twenty years.

Primary School of the Year

Barrowford Primary School

Barrowford Primary School is a highly inclusive community, which works to empower pupils by providing a rich curriculum and memorable learning experiences. Many of the children join the school with a range of needs. However, all pupils make good progress because of the inclusive curriculum and the dedication of staff. The inspirational headteacher, Rachel Tomlinson, has led staff through difficult times to become a highly improved school which now excels. Staff have carefully crafted a broad, knowledge-rich curriculum to meet the diverse needs of pupils and develop their cultural capital. The pupils develop very special personal

characteristics, as a result of its broad curriculum which addresses the development of the whole child and gives them a sound moral base. This allows pupils to go on to their secondary schools as confident young people.

Exciting things coming from ACT in 2022

After more than a decade, we are delighted to launch our new website to serve our members with greater efficiency and ease: and our new model Citizenship curriculum with schemes of work, lesson plans and resources being released to ACT organisational members from September. You will also see some changes to our brand identity. We are grateful to The Type Consultancy who provided pro bono brand consultancy and worked with our key stakeholders throughout the process. Although our logo and web presence is changing our mission remains the same. Leading innovative Citizenship research

In September 2022, we begin work on a unique research project which aims to assess the quality and impact of Citizenship, active Citizenship and democratic education across the country. Schools will be invited to complete a self-assessment survey which will allow us to benchmark information which we will then share and use to prioritise development plans to improve support. Selected research schools will also be able to access a student voice report which will enable your school to see how students compare to the national picture, giving an insight into the impact of your Citizenship provision and advice on how to incorporate this in future planning. We are delighted to work in collaboration with Middlesex University on this innovative new

research.
