Research informed workshops

Research informed sessions enhance your academic knowledge across the subject, as well as give you the wider context around the importance of democratic education.



Learning to give: A critical study exploring philanthropy education in primary schools

Dr Emily Lau and Dr Alison Body, Kent University

This workshop explores the idea of how philanthropic behaviours and attitudes are encouraged in primary schools in England. Presenting a definition of philanthropic Citizenship, the workshop will discuss the different ways primary school children experience volunteering, social action, charitable giving and advocacy.

This is an excellent opportunity to look at the transition skills between primary and secondary pupils in this area, and discover what can be learnt between phases regarding philanthropic giving.

Exploring subject knowledge for teaching in Citizenship

Hans Svennevig and Hugh Starkey, IOE, UCL's Faculty of Education and Society, and Lee Jerome, Middlesex University

The recent resurgence of interest in 'powerful knowledge' and 'knowledge rich education' poses a challenge for a subject so steeped in skills and values – just what knowledge is distinctive to Citizenship education? This workshop will share insights learnt from a series of 'generative conversations' between teachers describing their planning and teaching in relation to a topic, and subject experts reflecting on what constitutes core knowledge from their perspective.

The workshop will also focus on how teachers draw on multidisciplinary knowledge to build substantive concepts, how they plan for progression, and how they move between case studies and substantive concepts.

KEY FOCUS: *curriculum planning, knowledge rich curriculum, pedagogy*

Political engagement: What can schools do to tackle the social gap in political engagement?

Professor Jan Germen Janmaat, IOE, UCL's Faculty of Education, and Professor Bryony Hoskins, University of Roehampton

This workshop presents research on the development of social inequality in political engagement, and the factors that can explain this trend. It will share the main conclusions, recommendations, and incorporate feedback from Citizenship education teachers who attend the session within the research. The workshop addresses the theme of rising inequality as one of the challenges facing the next generation – a key theme that all conference participants are invited to reflect on. Delegates will leave the seminar with an enhanced insight in how schools can reduce social inequality through political engagement.

A research review for Active Citizenship

Yaqub Hilal and Faiza Hyder, Academic researchers, Association for Citizenship Teaching

In 2021-22, ACT conducted a systematic literature review of the research on Citizenship education, which identified over 100 peer-reviewed research articles. This workshop gives an evidence-based overview of what constitutes effective Citizenship teaching and considers some of the practical ways in which teachers can incorporate this evidence-based research both into their teaching practices and in their efforts to promote Citizenship education at school and beyond. This workshop will be useful for Citizenship teachers building an evidence-informed case for building Citizenship provision in school and will also consider practical strategies to inform planning and teaching.

The conference is all about the future: future challenges; generations; and, how the future of teaching needs to adapt. From technology to curriculum planning, you will leave the conference full of fresh ideas on how to educate your students for democratic life.



Citizenship education in the Metaverse: Opportunities and Risks

Leon Oldstrong, Writer and Director, and Hans Svennevig, IOE, UCL's Faculty of Education and Society

This practical workshop considers the possibilities emerging from virtual reality, immersive film, augmented reality, and extended reality. We start by exploring the landscape, the terms, and types of engagement, risks and harms that can be faced when using digital media. We showcase the Virtually There Movie for teachers so they can experience this first hand. We conclude with classroom strategies for democratisation of learning using technology. This session connects to articles in ACT's *Teaching Citizenship* journal Issue 55 on the Metaverse by Hans Svennevig and a student teacher who shares their experience of <https://www.virtuallytheremovie.com/>

Curriculum mapping for Citizenship and RE: How two disciplines can work in unison

Terri Barry, ACT Ambassador, Sandwicknoir High School

This practical workshop explores how RE can be taught through Citizenship. Sometimes students have a natural curiosity for Citizenship - in comparison to RE which can feel outdated. We discuss how Citizenship can help students understand the secular world around them, whilst understanding the diversity of different cultures and beliefs. We consider how concepts such as social justice can be tackled in both subjects through curriculum mapping and schemes of work. Teachers will leave with classroom ready ideas to use such as those from the "Deliberative Classroom; Religious Freedom" resources from ACT.

Getting voices heard at UK Parliament: How can your students engage digitally with select committees and petitions?

Zoe Backhouse, Head of Petitions Engagement, UK House of Commons, and Elliott Colburn, MP for Carshalton and Wallington

This workshop will provide you with an opportunity to explore the ways in which you can engage your students with responsible action based on real life parliamentary process.

You will develop knowledge on the work of the Petitions Committee at UK Parliament and discover how your students can digitally engage with select committees and petitions.

KEY FOCUS: *digital Citizenship, parliamentary process, responsible action*

Student voice: Increasing an impactful student voice ethos across your school

Kate Harris, CEO, VotesforSchools

Creating a Citizenship ethos and student voice climate throughout the school, while supporting your less confident colleagues in delivering Citizenship. This workshop will demonstrate how the whole school can get behind Citizenship activities, as schools embed Citizenship activities across curricula and harness their students' voices.

KEY FOCUS: *curriculum planning, student voice, whole school focus*



Pedagogy and practice workshops

On the cusp of human memory: Preparing to teach about the Holocaust in a world with no first-hand witnesses

Catrina Kirkland, Holocaust Educational Trust

As Holocaust survivors become fewer and frailer, teachers across the curriculum need to future-proof their teaching about this difficult topic. This session will equip Citizenship teachers with subject and pedagogical knowledge to enable them to discuss the stories of Holocaust survivors when they are no longer here. Participants will explore how issues related to the Holocaust can be discussed in the Key Stage 2 – Key Stage 5 Citizenship curriculum. We will consider how a sound exploration of the lives of real Jewish people can empower students to recognise and challenge misinformation, conspiracy theories and racist antisemitic tropes.

KEY FOCUS: *cross curricular, pedagogy, subject knowledge development*

Put your money where your mouth is: Discussions about Financial and Economic education

Olivia Platman, The Economist Educational Foundation

This practical workshop will explore how teaching about finance doesn't need to be dull. It will show how topical stories in the news can get students talking, and thinking critically, about the money that's in their pockets (or on their phone) and how this links to wider systems at play.

Delegates will leave with a range of innovative and flexible ideas, including a game to make sense of the financial crisis, a mind-stretching activity explaining just how far £1million can go, and a debate around cryptocurrencies.

KEY FOCUS: *finance and economic education, pedagogy, subject knowledge development*

Non-violent action: A force for change – inspiring young people to take positive action as citizens

Helen Griffin, DECSY, and Sikhumbuzo Ndlovu, Hinde House Secondary Academy

This workshop introduces curriculum materials developed and trialled by practising teachers which use the Philosophy for Children/Colleges methodology. The materials explore inspiring case studies of groups of people locally and from around the world, past and present, involved in non-violent social change. The resources help pupils to discuss local and global issues, decide actions and provide participation tools to carry activities out.

You will sample a dialogic learning activity from the resource, and reflect on how the materials can both enhance your citizenship curriculum and provide support for students facing overwhelming global challenges.

How to start your own newspaper in school: Advocacy through Global Journalists

Good journalism matters more than ever. Reporting the dizzyingly complex, fragile planet on which we all live has become one of the heroic endeavours of our age. Learn how to start young with The Day's editor, Richard Addis, one of the most experienced journalists in the world. Hosted by The Day, a digital newspaper for schools and founder of The Global Young Journalist Awards, this workshop will provide practical tips and a written guide to launching a school newspaper. You will also hear first-hand from this year's Global Young Journalist Award-winning students about their experience of journalism in school.

Selected research schools will also be able to access a student voice report, which will enable your school to see how your students compare to the national picture: giving you a real insight into what they think, how they are impacted and advice on how to incorporate this in future planning.


